PINEAPPLE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

Ingredients:

2 tbsp sugar

6 slices canned pineapple + 3 tbsp. juice

11 glacé cherries

100 g plain flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. bicarbonate of soda

100 g butter (plus some for greasing)

100 g caster sugar

2 eggs

Method:

Preheat oven to 200 °C / Gas 6.

Grease a 23 cm cake tin.

Sprinkle the 2 tbsp sugar on the base of the tin then arrange the pineapple slices on top.

Fill each pineapple ring with a cherry then dot a cherry in each gap.

Mix all the other ingredients together to make a smooth batter.

Pour the batter gently over the pineapple rings and spread it out.

Bake for 30 minutes.

Ease a spatula around the edge of the tin, put a serving plate on top and turn it upside down.
